




DC Department of Corrections Operating Budget and Net Expenditure in million dollars







DOC FY 2024 Budget by Service






FY 2024 Grade and Function Distribution of DOC Employees







DC Department of Corrections Average Daily Population by Fiscal Year for the Central Detention Facility (CDF) and DOC Total



DC Department of Corrections Average Daily Population by Calendar Year for the Central Detention Facility (CDF) and DOC Total




Average Daily Population by Sex and Facility for Fiscal Year 2024






Average Daily Population by Sex and Facility for Calendar Year 2024











Intakes and Releases for Women by Fiscal Year

Admission Types for FY 2024 Women Intakes











Intakes and Releases for Men by Fiscal Year

Admission Types for FY 2024 Men Intakes
















Intakes and Releases for Women by Calendar Year








DOC Intakes in FY 2024 by Primary Language Spoken






The majority of DOC residents, 91.61%, are English speakers; 5.25% declare a non-English primary language and data is unavailable for the remaining intakes— primarily because they were released before the intake process was completed.

Spanish, Amharic, and Arabic, and Russian were the most frequently declared non-English primary languages among new intakes at DOC in FY 2024.




DOC Intakes in FY 2024 by Faith Professed

FY 2024 Intakes by Faith Professed




In Fiscal Year 2024, DOC intakes were of the following religious faith groups, 39.66%, were of Christian faiths; 36.20% were of Islamic faiths; 2.92% were of other faiths; 2.76% were Jewish; and 15.63% had no faith declared.

Of those professing Christian faiths, the majority, 76.54%, claimed to be Christian; of those professing Islamic faiths, the majority, 68.87%, claimed to be Sunni Muslim.






DOC Residents in Custody by Race, Sex and Education




DOC residents are 87.4% Black; the District of Columbia (DC) population is 45% Black. Whites, Asians, and Hispanics who comprise 46.2%, 4.7%, and 11.7% of the DC Population are underrepresented. (DC Population data from www.census.gov.)

The majority of DOC's inmates are men. Women comprise under 6% of the population.




Self-Declared Education Attained by DOC Residents



61.68% of women and 60.61% of men in custody have earned a high school diploma or GED. 6.54% of women and 4.50% of men say they have a college degree. Data were not available for about 10.28% of women and 9.34% of men.









Over half of all men in custody were 18 to 40 years old. The average age of men in custody was 35 years.

About 58.81% men in custody were unemployed at the time of incarceration. About 35.9% were employed and another 2.59% were employed part time.

Employment Status at Incarceration Men






Length of Stay (LOS) for Men in Custody

LOS Distribution for Men in Custody



Over half of all men in custody (57.5%) had unresolved legal matters that were either felony charges (PF) or misdemeanor charges (PM). Those held for the USMS service (TR) were about 11.54% of those in custody and had stayed about a year and 3 months on average, the longest of all. About 7.48% of men were charged as parole violators (PV), about 13.51% were sentenced on felony charges (SF), about 8.84% were on sentenced on misdemeanor charges (SM), about 0.79% were Writs or Holds (WH), and about 0.34% were on other (OT) charges. About 40.35% of men in custody had stayed less than three months. About 40.63% stayed between three months and one year while 19.02% stayed more than one year. The median length of stay (LOS) for men in custody was 148 days. (Half the men in custody had been in custody less than 148 days.)

Average LOS for Men by Inmate Status






Most Serious Active Charge for Men in Custody


Homicide/Conspiracy/Kidnapping stayed the longest on average (1.7 years); followed by those charged with Writ/US Witness (1.1 years); followed by those with In-Transit USMS/USDC commitments (1.1 years). The average length of stay for men in custody was 269 days. 7.66% of men in custody were USMS/USDC commitments with unspecified charges. Those charged with assault, aggravated assault, domestic violence; homicide, conspiracy, or kidnapping; , carjacking or first degree burglary; weapons; parole or release violations; arson; property crimes; and drug offenses accounted for the most serious offenses of 82.63% of men in custody. 58.58% of men in custody were charged with a violent or dangerous offense per DC Code 22 Section 4501.

About Women in Custody




Majority of all women in custody were 18 to 40 years old. The average age of women in custody was 36 years.






About 69.44% of women in custody were unemployed at the time of incarceration. About 26.85% were employed and another 2.78% were employed part time.




Length of Stay (LOS) for Women in Custody




About 60.75% of women in custody had stayed less than three months. About 29.91% stayed between three months and one year while 9.35% stayed more than one year. The median length of stay (LOS) for women in custody was 53 days. (Half the women in custody had been in custody less than 53 days.)

About 62.62% of women in custody had unresolved charges that were either felonies (PF) or misdemeanors (PM). 3.74% of women in custody were held for the USMS (TR) and had stayed under 11 months on average, the longest of all. Those charged as parole violators (PV) were 1.87% of the women in custody. Those charged with sentenced felony (SF) charges made up 14.95% of the women in custody. Those charged with sentenced misdemeanor (SM) charges made up 15.89% of the women in custody. The remaining 1.87% were for other (OT) charges.





Most Serious Active Charge for Women in Custody



Women charged with assault, aggravated assault, or domestic violence as the most serious offense were 40.57% of all women in custody. Those charged with assault, domestic violence, homicide, conspiracy, or kidnapping; arson or property crimes; and robbery, carjacking or first degree burglar accounted for the most serious offenses of 78.30% of women in custody. 66.67% of women in custody were charged with a violent or dangerous offense per DC Code 22 Section 4501.



Those charged with Drug Offenses stayed the longest on average (8.4 months), followed by those charged with Homicide/Conspiracy/Kidnapping (7.25 months), then those charged with Robbery/Carjacking/Burglary (4.7 months). The average length of stay for women in custody was 116 days.




FY 2024 Releases by LOS for Men




The average length of stay to release for men was 97.3 days. Half of men who were released stayed fewer than 24.87 days, the median length of stay to release.

Of men who were released, 60.08% were released to the community. Another 19.68% were removed by the USMS to Northern Neck, USMS to federal facilities, or USMS GB. 16.05% were removed by all other jurisdictions.




CY 2024 Releases by LOS for Men



The average length of stay to release for men was 92 days. Half of men who were released stayed fewer than 23.1 days, the median length of stay to release.


Custody of Release Men CY 2023

Of men who were released, 60.47% were released to the community. Another 18.46% were removed by the USMS to Norther Neck, USMS to federal facilities, or USMS GB. 16.93% percent were removed by all other jurisdictions. 4.14% were released to St. Elizabeth's Hospital or treatment programs.




The average length of stay to release was 40.6 days for women. Half of all women who were released stayed fewer than 13.6 days, the median length of stay.

Recidivism Rate for DOC Intakes FY2024 Based on intake data from April 1, 2023 to March 31, 2024



Recidivism in the pre-COVID-19 era cannot be compared to that in current times because the composition of the DOC population and its length of stay have significantly changed. These reflect changes in practices across the criminal justice system that have been implemented in response to COVID-19.
