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K-9 Unit Successfully Completes Training Course

Department of Corrections K-9 Unit members were honored recently during a graduation ceremony for successfully completing a comprehensive 10-week training course.

Corporals **Terrance Wilson** and **David Thomas**, and their dogs, Cody and Caesar, were trained in drug search and detection techniques at the Maryland State Division of Corrections K-9 Headquarters in Hagerstown, Maryland.

The officers training included tactical deployment procedures. In order to graduate the dogs had to learn the various scents of the drugs they were expected to detect. At the graduation ceremony, the handlers and their dogs demonstrated some of the practices and techniques associated with efficient search and drug detection.

"I feel extremely confident that my dog Caesar is ready for duty," said Corporal Wilson. "During the field training exercises he was very aggressive and never showed any hesitation."

K-9 Units are used in the DOC to maintain control and security of the external and internal facilities. They also serve as a deterrent to trespassers. The addition of K-9 teams marks the first time dogs have been used since the close of Lorton in 2001.

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SEARS GOSPEL CHOIR PERFORMS AT CTF

The nationally renowned Sears Associate Gospel Choir performed in concert for the male and female inmates of the D.C.

Department of Corrections' contract Correctional Treatment Facility (CTF) in September.

The choir consisting of approximately 60 members, who all work for the Illinois headquarters, originally established in 1991 as part of Sears, Roebuck and Company's effort to develop and promote a good neighbor policy between the retail giant and its local communities. The choir has appeared in venues across the country

including the Cook County Jail, the Warrenville, Illinois Girls Juvenile Detention Center and numerous other corporate and civic organiza-

tions.

In addition to being featured in two nationally televised Sears commercials, the group recorded its first compact disc, "Songs of Celebration," in May 2001, and donated \$15,000 from the proceeds to the Annual Sears Coats for Kids Fundraiser which provides winter coats for lowincome children in the Chicago area.

DOC ATTENDS ANNUAL DSI USER GROUP CONFERENCE

Representatives from DOC attended the Digital Solutions, Inc. (DSI) annual User Group conference in Altoona, Pennsylvania, September 27 through October 1. DSI is the software company that created the Offender Management System (OMS) software, which is the heart of the JACCS (Jail and Community Corrections System) jail management system.

The conference provides an opportunity for clients to take part in the decision making process for implementing product changes. DOC is particularly interested in the sentencing, charges, bonds, and detainees modules in the OMS software. Having been a driving force in prompting DSI to enhance these modules, DOC was invited to discuss DSI's progress in making the changes. It is

expected that the modules will be implemented in the fall of 2005.

The agenda included an overview of Inmate Telephone Management System, a preview of the next software release, vendor product demonstrations, and OMS training sessions.

In addition, DSI staff assists in providing updates, product education and technology advancements to help users evaluate the efficiency of their facility/ staff in utilizing the OMS software to its full potential.

Attendees included 144 DSI customers from 59 jail facilities throughout the country. Attendees ranged from junior correctional officers to wardens and program directors, and facilities included some with as few as 75 beds and several with thousands of beds, including DOC.

This was the fourth DSI User Group that DOC has attended since launching JACCS in October 2000. DOC was well represented at the conference: Keith Godwin, Chief of Network Operations, Office of Management and Information Technology Services (OMITS); Reena Chakraborty, Statistician, OMITS; Dennis Harrison, Deputy Warden for Programs; Edgar Haynes, Chief, Records Office; Cheryl Warner, Special Assistant to the Chief. Records Office; Sergeant George Hendrix, Quality Assurance Staff, OMITS; and Lee Gazlav, Senior Jail Management Application Specialist, Anteon Corporation.

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CORRECTIONS' DESIRE FOR LOCAL CHAPTER DRIVES ACA MEMBERSHIP GOALS

The Department of Corrections is seeking staff to join the efforts to establish a local American Correctional Association (ACA) chapter.
